Think It Over: This section is about turning what God is saying to you into action steps. These talking points, questions, and scriptures are designed to help you take your own next step. If you are leading a group through this guide, don't feel like you have to answer every question. Pick out those questions that will stir up conversation and action among your group.

- When have you observed a wife that is completely loved by her husband? What were some of observations that caught your attention? How did that impact the wife's well-being?
- Read 1 Corinthians 7:16-17 MSG. What do you think are the applicable directions that can be applied not only when you have an unbelieving spouse, but an uncooperative but not abusive believing spouse? How does 2 Corinthians 12:8-10 come into play? How far can God's grace take you when it is so difficult?
- Read Matthew Henry's quote: "The woman was made out of Adam's side. She was not made out of his head to rule over him, nor out of his feet to be trampled upon by him, but out of his side to be equal with him, under his arm to be protected, and near his heart to be loved." What do you see as important? What might you change? How does it impact your perspective of marriage?
- Read 1 Peter 3:7 MSG. What principles does Peter, who was married, share about being a good husband? How can you apply these regardless of your marital status? What is the warning?
- Look up and read the following passages: Ephesians 6:4, Proverbs 24:26, Colossians 3:19, Philippians 2:3-4. What characteristics are seen in these verses that you would also say are vital to a good marriage?
- ➤ Read Prov. 5:18–21 MSG and in another translation. What are some of the takeaways from such a passage? What process does a husband need to begin to live that passage out? Verse 21 tells us God is watching. Is that a motivator? What can spouses do to make it easier to have a Prov. 5:18-21 marriage?

Next Steps: (For this question it might be good to have men and women split into two groups.) What are the take-aways from this message if you are not married? If married, which out of the "Love Your Wife" take-aways need your attention? If you are a husband, how could you, in a non-defensive way, discover which ones you may need to address? If you are a wife, how could you share a few of these that need some attention in your marriage? If that is not possible, how will you lean on God as you pray for your husband to become aware of them? Finally, evaluate your relationship giving yourself a percentage for specific relationships. What can you do to increase?
